Reps. Jaime Greene and Harris, having reserved the right to explain their protest against the passage of the bill, made the following statement:

“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

I won’t support a plan that allows the governor to gamble with the teacher pension system. Michigan’s public school teachers’ retirement fund, commonly known as MPSERS, is currently underfunded by more than \$34 billion. This plan would take away more than \$600 million from MPSERS to bankroll more unnecessary government spending. We aren’t going to attract or keep our hardworking teachers by playing around with retirement benefits that were promised to them. By voting no, I’m standing up for Michigan taxpayers, our teachers, and their hard-earned benefits.”

Rep. Bruck, having reserved the right to explain his protest against the passage of the bill, made the following statement:

“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

I cannot support a plan that gambles away the teacher pension system. Michigan’s public school teachers’ retirement fund, commonly known as MPSERS, is currently underfunded by more than \$34 billion. This plan would take away more than \$600 million from MPSERS to fund unrelated government spending. I stand for eliminating the 3% employee portion, without raiding the fund of the current overages. I believe the bill as presented does not help our education system, taxpayers, or teachers in the long run.”

The program provides Direct Subsidized Loans, Direct Unsubsidized Loans, Direct PLUS Loans, and Direct Consolidation Loans to eligible borrowers; and

Whereas, Despite having been established to make higher education an attainable reality for all Americans, the federal student loans program has instead facilitated a new array of problems, including a precipitous rise in tuition costs, making higher education more expensive and unaffordable for many Americans; and

Whereas, The loans have also contributed to a student loan debt crisis in the United States, with about 43 million borrowers holding over 1.7 trillion dollars in federal student loan debt alone. The average amount owed is over 37,000 dollars per borrower. Student loan debt is now the second highest consumer debt category behind mortgage debt; and

Whereas, The massive amount of student loan debt is a burden on the entire economy. Because of this debt, many Americans are struggling to become homeowners, save for retirement, and contribute to the economy in other ways; and

Whereas, Mandatory repayment of federal student loans resumed in October 2023 after the end of the U.S. Department of Education's temporary pause of such payments due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to October 2023, the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau found that over five million people faced serious financial risk once payments resumed. Borrowers who face difficulty paying their debt face delinquency and default; and

Whereas, If borrowers can no longer be expected to pay their student loan debt, the federal government must stop issuing it. Additionally, discontinuing the issuance of federal student loans could prevent economic crises in the future; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives, That we urge Congress to repeal the William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan Program; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the President of the United States Senate, and the members of the Michigan congressional delegation.

The resolution was referred to the Committee on Government Operations.
