SUMMARY:

House Bill 5049 would amend the Revised School Code to change what devices may be used to administer epinephrine in schools. Presently, certain individuals are allowed to use an epinephrine auto-injector if they have been properly trained. The bill would allow the use of an *epinephrine delivery system*, as defined in the Public Health Code (HB 5050).

380.1179a

House Bill 5050 would amend the Public Health Code to add a definition for *epinephrine delivery system* and to update references from “auto-injector” to “delivery system.”

Epinephrine delivery system would include, but not be limited to, an epinephrine auto-injector, an epinephrine inhaler, or epinephrine nasal spray.

MCL 333.17744a and 333.17744d

House Bill 5051 would amend the Law Enforcement and Firefighter Access to Epinephrine Act to update references from “auto-injector” to “delivery system.” The bill would add a definition for *epinephrine delivery system* that matches the one in HB 5050.

MCL 28.821 et seq.

House Bill 5052 would amend 1973 PA 116 (which governs childcare organizations) to update references from “auto-injector” to “delivery system.” The bill would cite the definition added to the Public Health Code by HB 5050.

MCL 722.127a

House Bill 5053 would amend section the Public Health Code to update references from “auto-injector” to “delivery system” and to add a definition for *epinephrine delivery system* that matches the definition added by HB 5050.

MCL 333.20919

House Bill 5054 would the Revised School Code to update references from “auto-injector” to “delivery system” and cite the definition for *epinephrine delivery system* added to the Public Health Code by HB 5050.

MCL 380.1178 and 380.1179

The bills are tie-barred to each other, meaning each cannot take effect unless all are enacted into law.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The bills would have no fiscal impact on the state or on local school districts, intermediate school districts (ISDs), or public school academies (PSAs).

House Bills 5050, 5053, and 5054 would have no fiscal impact on the Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs (LARA).

House Bill 5051 would have no fiscal impact on the Department of State Police.

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
