HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 219

Reps. Mentzer, Brixie, Miller, Price, Wooden, Young,

O'Neal, MacDonell and Hoskins offered the following resolution:

- A resolution urging the federal government to not extend the emergency order preventing the planned closure of the J.H. Campbell Power Plant.
- Whereas, On March 11, 2022, the Midcontinent Independent
- 5 System Operator (MISO) approved the suspension of three generating
- 6 units at the J.H. Campbell Power Plant in West Olive, Michigan.
- 7 These suspensions were to occur by June 1, 2025, with permanent
- 8 cessation of coal combustion occurring by December 31, 2028. In
- 9 granting approval, MISO projected that there would be a sufficient

- 1 energy supply to meet consumer demand without the continued
- 2 operation of the J.H. Campbell Power Plant; and
- 3 Whereas, Despite MISO's findings and approvals, on May 23,
- 4 2025, the United States Department of Energy issued an emergency
- 5 order (Order No. 202-25-3) directing MISO to continue operation of
- 6 the J.H. Campbell Power Plant until August 21, 2025. The order was
- 7 issued to combat an alleged energy emergency; and
- 8 Whereas, On August 21, 2025, the United States Department
- 9 Energy issued another order (Order No. 202-25-7) to extend the
- 10 effect of Order No. 202-25-3 until November 19, 2025. The new order
- 11 alleges that the emergency conditions that led to the issuance of
- 12 Order No. 202-25-3 are continuing; and
- Whereas, Order 202-25-3 and Order 202-25-7 conflict with
- 14 Consumers Energy's decision to stop using coal as a fuel source for
- 15 electricity by 2025; and
- 16 Whereas, Not only do the Department of Energy's orders
- 17 conflict with and infringe upon the decision to stop using coal as
- 18 a fuel source for electricity by 2025, they are also having a
- 19 financial impact. Continued operation of the J.H. Campbell Power
- 20 Plant cost Consumers Energy and its ratepayers 29 million dollars
- 21 in the first 38 days of continued operation alone. The
- 22 decommissioning of the plant was estimated to save ratepayers 600
- 23 million dollars by the year 2040; and
- 24 Whereas, In addition to the financial consequences, the
- 25 continued operation of the J.H. Campbell Power Plant presents both
- 26 health and environmental concerns. The plant releases millions of
- 27 pounds of air pollutants annually, including sulfur dioxide,
- 28 nitrogen oxides, and fine particulate matter. Nearly 9 million tons
- 29 of climate-harming carbon dioxide are also released annually. The

- 1 air pollution generated by coal plants has been linked to several
- 2 negative health impacts such as asthma, cancer, heart conditions,
- 3 and lung conditions. The J.H. Campbell Power Plant has been
- 4 estimated to cause between 389 and 879 million dollars in health
- 5 impacts annually; and
- 6 Whereas, The J.H. Campbell Power Plant has also been estimated
- 7 to release roughly 100,000 pounds of water-polluting substances
- 8 annually, including 10,000 pounds of toxic metals such as arsenic.
- 9 A monitoring well near the plant measured arsenic levels 5.7 times
- 10 the federal limit for drinking in 2017; and
- 11 Whereas, Legal challenges have been brought against the
- 12 Department of Energy's order, arguing that it is illegal and
- 13 arbitrary. However, while these legal challenges make their way
- 14 through the judicial system, the federal government should refrain
- 15 from extending Order No. 202-25-3 once again to best serve the
- 16 hardworking people directly impacted by the continued operation of
- 17 the J.H. Campbell Power Plant; now, therefore, be it
- 18 Resolved by the House of Representatives, That we urge the
- 19 federal government to not extend the emergency order which
- 20 prevented the planned closure of the J.H. Campbell Power Plant; and
- 21 be it further
- 22 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the
- 23 United States Secretary of Energy and the members of the Michigan
- 24 congressional delegation.
